

September 2020 – August 2021 Annual Report Grace and peace in the name of Christ,

This past year has been one of the more unique and challenging years that I have faced both at Grace and in my time as a pastor. As we began the year, we kept thinking that the COVID pandemic was going to end soon. Little did we know that it wouldn't be until after Easter that we would finally partially reopen for worship. Even here in the summer, we are finding that more than half of our regular weekly worship attendance is worshipping online. In many ways, the decisions about reopening have been significantly more challenging and complex than the original decision to close church facilities on March 15, 2020.

As we continue to creep out of this pandemic, we are finding ourselves in a strange and uncomfortable position. After almost 18 months of this pandemic, the daily toll on everyone's lives is very evident. My sense is that many in the congregation are weary, lonely, confused, frustrated, and many other emotions. I really do believe that these later days (we hope) of the pandemic have been the most difficult.

I am reminded of the familiar story from Luke's gospel, the Road to Emmaus. A couple of unnamed disciples are traveling after Jesus had been killed in Jerusalem. As they travel, someone they do not know approaches them and walks with them in their grief and questions. And this fellow traveler seems to not know about what had happened with Jesus in Jerusalem. The disciples respond to his questions:

[Jesus] said to them, What are you discussing with each other while you walk along? They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days? He asked them, What things? They replied, The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. (Luke 24:17-21a)

We had hoped.... I have heard it said that these are some of the most haunting words in the bible. Why? Because they speak to something deep within us, our own longings and unmet hopes. We had hoped that this pandemic would not be as bad as predicted. We had hoped that we could contain this virus before it spread sSo widely in our community. We had hoped that mask mandates and physical distancing would only be a temporary message. We had hoped that avoiding restaurants and shopping online, skipping trips to see grandparents and grandchildren, would just be a small sacrifice. We had hoped that once a vaccine was available that everyone would commit to ending this pandemic. The accumulated grief over the past year is going to leave a lasting mark on all of our lives. All the unmet hopes of the past 18 months, the deep losses and growing tensions and divisions in the world around us, are not going to magically disappear. And yet, there is also something powerful emerging, displayed in the resilience of our congregation and our communities. So much has been lost, and yet so much has also been learned.

Prior to the pandemic, we had been slowly moving more things online, including a massive update to our church database system. Over the past year, we have been able to move all of our ministry online. Some of the things that we have been doing were temporary, but some new ways of doing ministry and engaging with each other will likely continue.

Here are some highlights of ministries that took on a different shape over the past year:

- We developed a way for creating high quality, engaging, and worshipful online services.
- We offered monthly live Zoom Communion worship services.
- We grew our Adult Faith Formation participation through all-online classes that engaged challenging in open and honest ways. Over the past year, we have done the following book studies: So You Want to Talk About Race?, The Cross and the Lynching Tree, Company of Strangers, Freedom of a Christian, Moral Leadership for a Divided Age, and Brave Talk.
- We offered more connections to NC Synod and the many resources provided during the pandemic through the Bishop's office.
- We moved all of our meetings onto Zoom, and have found that to be very effective for many of these types of gatherings, especially during the winter months!
- We experimented with doing some drive-thru and parking lot events along with more outdoor activities.
- Our online ministries have helped us to engage a wider audience in worship and other faith formative activities.

Despite all the challenges that we have faced together, some really amazing ministry opportunities have emerged. And this, in the end, is the promise that we cling to when we worship a Lord who died but then also was raised.

[The disciples continue] "Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him." (Luke 24:21b-24)

Though we have had many hopes that have not been realized over the past year, we also have discovered that in our grief and longing, we do not walk alone! Jesus is with us on all the challenging roads of life; when we worship a God who is alive and with us, we discover that possibilities abound. The hope that we had thought was lost rises from the grave, and with it, new hope emerges.

Please know that my prayers have been with each and every one of you over this last year. None of us has experienced anything like this before, and yet I have been inspired by your support of me and my family and also your commitment to this ministry of Grace that we share. When we together share God's love, I really do believe that ALL will be served and supported.

These were not always easy decisions and we found that some in the congregation felt we moved too slowly, while others are still not comfortable with gathering in person.

Most of my tenure as Council president has been during the COVID-19 pandemic. This isn't quite what I expected when I took on this role, but I have learned and grown as a result of the challenges this presented. I want to thank all the dedicated and thoughtful members of the Council for their hard work, dedication, and prayerful decisions over the past two years.

Stewardship Team ~ Pastor Steve Troisi SERVING MINISTRY

The Stewardship Ministry continued to function as a task of the Council with support from the Administrative Secretary and Financial Secretary this past year. With the congregation continuing to refrain from meeting in-person for almost nine months of the year, and with in-person attendance only slowly ramping up, the giving of the congregation has remained steady.

Congregation members and friends of Grace have found ways to support the ministry that we share by sending offerings through the mail and online. We are currently on track to come close to matching our level of giving from the previous year, about \$300,000!

Because of COVID, the annual Stewardship Drive was a little delayed with the culmination of the drive being Sunday, August 15th. The theme for our Stewardship emphasis this year is "About to do a new thing!" This year we are focusing on all the new things that we have learned through the pandemic and imagining how it will reshape our ministry for the future. Each of the 6 weeks of the drive highlights something new we've tried in ministry over the past year that we would like to find a way to continue and asking for the support of the congregation (time, talent and treasure) as we enter this new season of ministry together!

Growing Grace Capital Campaign ~ Pastor Steve Troisi

In the Fall of 2020, we gathered a small group of leaders from the congregation to participate in a series of Synod trainings to help launch a Capital Campaign, Growing Grace. This project had three major foci:

(1) supporting our Outreach Partners by investing 10% of every gift into the Troutman Foundation;

(2) pay off the Councill Property Mortgage which began as \$1.8 million in 2007; and

(3) renovate the Carriage House to create a fully updated Vicarage and allow more flexibility for the use of the Grace Place in the future.

We were thrilled with the congregational response which included both gifts and pledges to this drive! Because of the generosity of our congregation, we were able to pay off the Councill Property Mortgage in full by February 2021! Thanks be to God! We will continue to receive gifts toward the Growing Grace Campaign through the end of 2021.

In July 2021, the Visitation Team members were given permission by the Church Council to make person-to-person visits.

Grace Builders Ministry ~ Harold Stophel, Team Leader SERVING MINISTRY

Dear Friends in Christ, This Report covers the fiscal period from July 1, 2020 to July 1, 2021

COVID-19: The greatest effect of the virus on our team and work was the reduced number of volunteers working. We regularly prayed for those who could not come, that they would be safe and well. We also gave thanks for those who could come. They worked long and often to keep the ministries going, especially the Firewood Ministry. We Glorify God that, as far as we know, no one working or sheltering contracted the virus!

As a reminder, Grace Builders does not have a line item in the church budget. We operate totally on funds from other sources, such as personal donations, Troutman Foundation, Thrivent, fund-raisers and God's generous blessings. We try to focus more on the needs in front of us and trust that God will provide what resources are needed.

We want to acknowledge our brothers and sisters from First Presbyterian Church, who are partners with us in the Firewood Ministry and some of the other outreach projects. Their involvement for these several years has been wonderful. We also wish to acknowledge the support and participation of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity at ASU who come frequently to split wood, help with spring and fall cleanups, and work on fund-raising. We are also blessed by several individual volunteers who help with great regularity. In recent years, we are blessed to have a few of our professional wood people who help us greatly by dropping logs on our lot. This is a great help, especially because our fewer number of volunteers can focus on sawing and splitting firewood rather than gathering trees.

Many of our costs were higher this year due to the age and usage of our tools and equipment. Virtually all our battery-powered hand tools had to be replaced. A lot of repairs or replacements were needed for our heavier equipment as well.

<u>SUMMARY</u>

This year, we completed 64 Projects/Activities (38 Internal and 26 Outreach) in addition to the Firewood Ministry.

To accomplish this required:

OUTREACH PROJECTS

We finished 21 smaller projects which were to help people with physical needs due to health issues or lack of financial resources. These include such things as modifications or home repairs, safety equipment, etc. These 21 projects required 607 hours of work and \$4,529 in materials. We also completed 5 larger projects as listed below.

• **RASH PROJECT** - Mr. Rash has Parkinson's Disease which for the last year has caused him to fall many times. His many falls have caused not only injuries, but many, many damages to a lot of walls, furniture and doors. Falls in one bathroom actually broke through the floor. There were no safety rails in the house. We replaced the floor, repaired and reinforced the walls and installed a great many safety rails in both bathrooms and the shower. We also repaired the doors and the furniture as well as possible.

Volunteer Hours- 100 COST- \$570

• **PATTI PROJECT** (BRADFORD TRAILER PARK) - This lady was suddenly and without justification, evicted from her rental trailer. She was given only a few days to be out. Over the past year, we had made several repairs and improvements to the trailer to make it safer and more livable. Some of those costs are included here. She searched all around this area and couldn't find anything available that she could afford. She finally contacted a brother who had a small condo in Laurenburg, NC. He finally agreed to let her move there temporarily. On Dec. 1st, in a snowstorm, we loaded her belongings into a rental truck and trailer. The next day, we moved her to the condo. The round trip and unloading took another full day. Volunteer Hours- 123 Cost- \$832

- **DEREK'S TRAILER PROJECT** This was a "911" project this past November. This young man was attempting to live in an old, small trailer that was really unlivable. There were huge holes in the floor (largest one was 2 ft. X 8 ft.) and a crack in one corner from floor to ceiling that you could put your arm through. There was no heat and very little electricity. Half of the roof leaked in many places. The location and situation would not allow for a replacement used trailer. Our only option was to re-roof the half roof, rebuild over the corner that was ripped open, and rebuild the floor over all the holes to keep out the elements. We also purchased a new, modern kerosene heater and some fuel. Volunteer Hours 57 Cost- \$383
- **"JUST" CLEANUP PROJECT** We had built a Wheelchair Ramp last year for this family. The husband was suffering from Parkinson's Disease and passed away. The wife sold the house and needed help clearing away the large quantity of wood, lumber, some equipment and trash/scrap. She donated the useful materials to us. We turned the rest into firewood. Volunteer Hours- 117 Cost- N/A
- "DAN VU" PROJECT We scheduled a day to cut and split firewood for Dan and his wife as he was recovering from a hip surgery. He has been a volunteer in our Firewood Ministry and contributed very many trees from his land over recent years. We took our equipment to his home. We cut, split and stacked wood enough to get them through the winter. It is a joy and pleasure to help some of our own. Volunteer Hours- 66 Cost- N/A

INTERNAL PROJECTS

We completed 38 smaller internal projects and 5 larger projects at Grace, requiring a total of \$4,187 and 825 Volunteer Hours.

Some examples of the smaller ones are:

Several repairs to the Councill House, Grace Place facilities, Grace Lutheran inside and out. We participated in spring and fall cleanups, helped with re-striping the parking lot, assisted Altar Guild with banners, the cross and decorations for the special days and seasons. We installed an auto-dump system for a dehumidifier at Councill House. We set up and removed tents, table and chairs for several outside events, made several small repairs to toilets, electrical devices and assisted with sound system upgrades. We reworked the Usher's Closet, built a closet for the pastor's office for his robes and many more things that required time and money.

The larger projects are as follows:

- NARTHEX DOOR REDESIGN The church Council requested a rework of the main front doors that would permit more natural light to come in. I designed three options. The current design was selected as it gave us maximum light without weakening the strength of the doors. Henry Vaughn at Vaughn Woodworking did an amazing job with the cutting, window installation and refinishing. We did the rest, including building temporary doors for the interim. Henry donated a large part of his cost! Volunteer Hours- 121 Cost- \$879
- **NEW LIGHTS** Many lights in the older areas of the church were in poor condition and inefficient. We replaced the ceiling fixtures in the office hallway, the nursery hallway, the two office bathrooms, the fellowship hallway, and several lights in the narthex. These were nearly all LED Units.

Volunteer Hours- 53 Cost- \$1,146

• **GRACE STONE SIGN** - The main stone Grace sign blew down in a heavy windstorm about a year and a half ago. We had repaired it several times over the past 30 years or so. We will replace it with the original stones plus some new ones, but 4 feet closer to the street and a bit taller, so it will be more visible. Most of the labor and cost will happen in the upcoming year.

Volunteer Hours: 46 Cost: \$312

• **LARGE TENTS** - We often have need of larger tents for outdoor activities such as reunions, funerals and group activities. We purchased two white 10X20 foot tents and they have been used several times this year with success.

Volunteer Hours: 6 Cost: \$286

• **MIDDLE PARKING LOT** – We are experiencing a lot of runoff from Lot #2, the middle lot, down onto Stophel Strasse, which for the most part was draining under the main building. To stop this, we poured a curb around the lower part of the building that would turn the water towards Tracy Circle Street's drainage system. Volunteer Hours: 55 Cost:\$150

HELPING HANDS WOOD MINISTRY

The Firewood Ministry had another busy year, with over 600 loads of firewood. We give the wood for free to people who heat with wood but cannot afford to buy it. The Hunger & Health Coalition and WeCAN Agencies help select the people who will receive it. We do the work and pay all the costs. Most of the raw wood has come from individual donors in the surrounding communities. Gathering the raw wood to the Wood Lot is the most time-consuming part of the operation. We build a backstock of logs which we used as an "Emergency Fund" to help us through the really bad days in winter when it was difficult to go out to collect more wood.

A special note of appreciation for all the individuals and outside groups of other volunteers who came from ASU, other universities and churches, charities and agencies. We would love to have more volunteers, especially from our own Grace family. We also appreciate the professional tree people who are continuing to bring us larger quantities of wood. What a blessing! This enables us to focus on sawing and splitting firewood rather than gathering. That enables us to produce more firewood for our clients.

Volunteer Hours -3,891 Costs - \$8,403

Edwin F. Troutman & Family Foundation ~ Kevin Patterson SERVING MINISTRY

The Edwin F. Troutman and Family Foundation was established for the purpose of furthering the mission work of Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church. The board meets twice a year. Assuming there is enough growth in the fund, we review applications and make awards.

The board was served by the following members this past year: Pastor Steve, Gail Lund, Kevin Patterson, Jeff Voss, Jeff Ramsdell, and John Smyre.

The Troutman Foundation Board met on March 7th to review grant applications. We received 11 applications and awarded \$17,000. Those funds were distributed in April.

The Troutman Foundation is making a difference. Most every year we are able to make investments in our community that help bring hope and comfort to others.

This past church year has been a very difficult time for all of us. Yet, we have found ways to be together, to share the joys of God's love, and to reconfigure our ways of expressing our love of God and of our neighbors. A special word of thanks is due to all those whose love and devotion have enabled us to carry on.

We have moved of necessity into the electronic age, thanks especially to the hard work of Pastor Steve, Libby Brown, Steve Frank, Susan Frank, Lauren Johnson, and countless other members of our congregation. Sunday morning services have been available on YouTube and Facebook since the beginning of the pandemic, as have been special communion services, Lenten services, and even services in the parking lots. Many thanks to our adult choir and to our Ringers of Grace. We have received helpful advice and standards from the North Carolina Synod of the ELCA. Extensive work was done to repair and enhance our pipe organ, and the Wrights donated a fine Yamaha Clavinova digital piano for our choir loft.

As the church has begun to open up, the Council has sought to walk a fine line between everyone's desire to fully gather again in worship, and the need to ensure the safety of those attending worship. We wish to be done with the pandemic, but the pandemic may not yet be done with us. Caution seems the prudent course as we look forward optimistically to the day when we can gather together again fully and unimpeded for a worship and music ministry that will build us all up. The environment will in some ways be forever changed, as in the Council's decision to permanently continue the electronic availability of our worship services, but, with God's help, the future is bright. We seek God's guidance as we anticipate moving into a post-COVID world.

We had adjusted to pandemic conditions as we began the new year, offering Sunday worship services on YouTube and Facebook and incorporating the Holden Evening Prayer into our monthly ZOOM platform communion service. I monitored and relayed results of each phase of the ongoing International Performing Arts Aerosol Study regarding the safety of singing. Hopefully, this research was helpful to the council as they navigated our journey through the pandemic.

The Grace Virtual Chancel Choir met by ZOOM on Wednesdays to meet and greet and rehearse/review new anthems. The choir offered 46 virtual anthems since May 2020. They also offered the Christmas Cantata, *Canticles in Candlelight*, by Joseph M. Martin, in virtual form on December 20. We were thrilled to continue the tradition of a Christmas Cantata during the pandemic and pray that it was a blessing to all who watched and heard the message of Christmas through music. The music offerings by the choir were a vital part of our online worship. The Ringers of Grace resumed in-person rehearsals on March 17, 2021. We started by ringing songs with no or minimal bell changes or table techniques and used music stands instead of tables. The ringers quickly progressed to individual tables that allowed us to maintain appropriate distances and ring more intricate pieces. The Ringers of Grace members' talents, dedication, and devotion to the music ministry of Grace.

We held two in-person services in the parking lot on Christmas Eve. It was so nice to worship with people even though it was raining a bit. A third service was scheduled but was cancelled due to a quick and dramatic change in weather conditions – the temperature dropped, wind increased, sleet and snow fell and began accumulating immediately. It was a Christmas Eve service to remember.


Mid-week Lenten services were offered on YouTube and Facebook. The theme was "Not my will but yours be done." This was the refrain from "Kneeling in the Garden Grass," a hymn by John Tirro. The hymn tells the story of the passion in 15 verses. The sermon hymns each week featured three verses. Special thanks to Doris Bazzini-Crothers for sharing her beautiful and powerful "Lenten Prayer" for our opening hymn each week. The Palm/Passion Sunday included a readers' theater offered by seven members of Grace. We observed a ZOOM communion service on Maundy Thursday and followed The Way of the Cross Liturgy for an online Good Friday Service. The Resurrection of our Lord was celebrated with in-person services in the parking lot. Music was provided by Susan Frank on the piano and a brass quintet from ASU. Choir members led the hymns. It was a glorious Easter Day. The Choir resumed in-person rehearsal with a hybrid in-person/ZOOM rehearsal format on May 5. It has been exciting to sing together again! The overwhelming majority of members are fully vaccinated and have been most cooperative in observing appropriate mitigation factors. We are thankful to a gracious donor for providing Performance Series Facemasks by *Marchmaster* for each choir member.


We express our thanks and appreciation to JoAnn and Morgan Wright for the generous donation of a fine Yamaha Clavinova digital piano for the choir loft. The Clavinova has a grand-style cabinet that takes up less space than a traditional acoustic. *GrandTouch Keyboard* action combined with world-class piano samples makes for an unrivaled piano experience from a digital piano. We look forward to using this fine instrument during worship. In April, organ builders Jake Hall and Jim, from the Cornell Zimmer Organ Company of Charlotte, came to Boone and made remarkable maintenance and repairs to our organ. The team removed the grill cloth enclosing much of the organ's works (swell box). This has allowed the pipes in the swell box to be heard with more clarity. The sound was being squelched by decades of accumulated dust and grime. The organ "voices" were out of tune with each other, giving the organ an unintended vibrato, which was at times screeching. They tuned the pipes and the result is a more pleasing sound.

As more and more people were vaccinated, it became possible to safely gather for in-person worship. With the guidance of the Council, we gathered for our first in-person worship on April 18 and have gradually added elements of worship to our service. We began offering communion each Sunday on May 19, congregational hymn singing on June 20, and singing the full liturgy on July 4. It is a joy to be able to worship fully with our brothers and sisters in Christ.

As we continue to find our "new normal," it is important to reflect on our experience. On March 11, 2020 we gathered for a mid-week Lenten service. We had no idea it would be 15 months before we would worship together in person again. However, the church did not close. I mourn so much that has been lost: time, time together in worship, music ensembles, small groups, missions. I mourn the isolation experienced by so many - not being able to spend time with family and friends in good times and bad -- not to mention travel and dining out. However, there have been some positive things that have happened in the last year. I celebrate the online worship ministry that has evolved because of the pandemic. We may never know how many people receive a blessing from the online services. I celebrate the ZOOM choir gatherings and musicians who found new ways to share their musical talents and sing to the glory of God. I celebrate the online classes and Bible Studies that have fed our souls. Now, we joyfully move forward; encouraged, renewed and inspired with a deeper appreciation to worship in God's house. And I pray that all our church family and friends will soon feel safe and comfortable to gather in fellowship and worship.

Special thanks are in order as we conclude this year: to Pastor Steve and the Council for their leadership and encouragement during the pandemic, to Susan and Steve Frank, and Lauren Johnson for faithfully providing music for our services, to Beth Reavis and the Altar Guild for making the Sanctuary so beautiful each week, to Bishop Tim Smith and the NC Synod ELCA for their guidance, and to our professional organizations, ACDA (American Choral Director's Association) and ALCM (Association of Lutheran Church Musicians) for their research and support. Because of COVID, this Board did not formally meet over the past year. The Board however did approve providing \$5,000 in support of expanding Deacon Stacey's position to 15 hours per week.

Property Team ~ Jennifer Stamey, Staff Liaison SUPPORTING MINISTRY

Mission Statement: The Property Team exists to support the mission of this congregation by ensuring that the maintenance of the Church's facilities and grounds are well taken care of. Our campus includes the main church building, the Grace Place, the Councill House, and the Carriage House. Grace Lutheran Church is not only used for worship and fellowship, but is heavily used by other people and organizations in the community. We believe part of the Church's outreach ministry is to share God's love and grace. The Property Team is here to be of service to all of our church families and the community by keeping our facilities clean, safe and in great shape for all who visit Grace Lutheran Church.

The Property Team has had a busy and productive year maintaining all the church properties. We want to take this time to thank the congregation for all of their help to keep this church in good running order. We are mindful of our spending and use our resources available to the best of our ability. We couldn't do it without the helping hands of Grace Builders and the volunteers who come out on our cleanup days, take on special projects around the church, or without the financial support of the congregation's monetary contributions.

What we've been up to:

- Spent a lot of time making the building as safe as possible with Covid -19 protocols that are ever changing. We put up signs, bought hand sanitizing stations, provided masks, made 6' markers to help people be socially distant, and bought a fogging machine to spray after events to kill any germs left behind. We also worked with our heating and cooling company to service air handlers and furnaces and provided new high efficiency air filters to also help keep germs from circulating in the air.
- Had the main Narthex door replaced with a commercial half-glass door to improve lighting and to be more welcoming.
- Grace Builders had windows cut in the solid double wooden doors in the Narthex to add more lighting. Harold Stophel created and painted a plaster luther rose in the center of each door.
- Redecorated the Narthex and painted and updated the usher closet.
- The Fellowship Hall was updated with new paint and the bulletin boards taken down. The entryways to the Fellowship Hall were also painted, ceiling tiles replaced, and new LED light fixtures installed.
- The hallway by the sacristy was also painted with new LED light fixtures installed in that hallway, the office hallway, and the two office bathrooms.
- The exterior of the church building was also repainted, including the double wooden doors to the Fellowship Hall.
- Tree trimming was done all over our campus including around the parking lots and both Grace Place and the Councill House. A giant Hemlock tree was removed at the Councill House that was dying and leaning towards the house.

- There were boiler repairs at the church and the Councill House and heat pump and sewline repairs at the Grace Place.
- New River Light & Power replaced light bulbs in the parking lot lights.
- The roof at the Councill house was repaired due to a major leak.
- Purchased and replaced lightbulbs in the sacristy and chapel with new daylight bulbs to provide more light.
- Rented parking to students and changed registration to all online.
- Cleaned out the Carriage House after the renter Mike moved out and have been working on what will become of the house.
- Annual maintenance items that were done include: heat pumps, boilers, furnaces, AC units, fire extinguishers, smoke alarm system, backflow preventers, carpet cleaning, snow removal, lawn care, and much more.
- We had three outside cleanup days where we bagged leaves, trimmed bushes, & spread 20 yards of mulch. We used Thrivent Action Team funds to purchase food and supplies for these volunteer events.













What we hope to do in the future: Short-Term projects:

- Install an instant water heater in the basement bathrooms.
- Replace and add to the signage around the church inside and out.
- Paint interior of the Councill House.

Long-Term Projects:

- Roof replacement on church
- Install a smoke alarm system
- Additional lighting in Sanctuary
- Furnace and boiler replacement
- Air Conditioning replacement in choir loft
- Repave parking lot(s)

2021-2022 Grace Lutheran Budget Narrative

UNPRECEDENTED CHALLENGES

This last year was one of the most remarkable and challenging years in history and in the ministry of our congregation.

- Little did we know that when we worshiped together in person on March 8th, 2020, that we would not be back in the sanctuary worshiping in person again until April 18th, 2021.
- Our initial concern was around whether we would be able to continue to support our staff and facilities if our generous members were not in our pews regularly.
- The uncertainty along with the many twists and turns over the past year have challenged us as a congregation to develop new ways to connect with each other and serve in Jesus' name.

UNPRECEDENTED RESPONSE

As we look toward the end of the fiscal year, while we are projecting a slight **decrease** in our General Fund offerings of <u>about 3%</u> from last year, in many ways, it feels like we have some momentum! *How is that possible?*

- Because of COVID, we were unable to run our regular stewardship appeal in 2020, receiving about half of the number of pledges as we did in 2019. However, this year we added 9 new pledging families.
- While for years a good percentage of giving had come in online and through the mail, with the church facilities closed, all of our giving needed to switch to these methods.
- Over the past year, a few of our very generous members have moved to be closer to family or died.

Given these challenges, it feels remarkably spirit-inspired that we will come so close to matching our giving from the previous year!

But not only that, last year we also had the **Growing Grace Capital Campaign**! This \$200,000 campaign was designed to grow the Troutman Foundation (\$20,000), pay off our Councill Property Mortgage (\$90,000) and create an updated Vicarage (\$90,000). It was a thrill to be able to pay off our mortgage, which began at \$1.8 million in 2007, in February of this year! To date, we have received almost \$100,000, and still have about \$35,000 remaining that has been pledged to the campaign.

The twists and turns over the past year have challenged us as a congregation to develop new ways to connect with each other and to serve in Jesus' name. The generosity of each and every one of you has allowed for us as a congregation to approach these challenges with creativity and trust in God's leading and provision.

NEW THINGS AHEAD

Overall, the proposed budget is very similar to the current year's budget. We will be tightening our belts just a little bit more to make room for a few new ministry opportunities.

- The biggest addition to the budget is the NEW Audio/Visual Ministry Facilitator. This part-time position will take over the responsibility of recording, editing and posting the online worship services each week.
- This budget reduces the Jeffcoat-Proctor Endowment subsidy which supports the Campus Minister position.
- The Council continues to be committed to developing a plan for the Wilkes County Property and finding ways to reduce or alternatively fund the Tax and Liability Insurance burden on the budget.
- Overall we have been able to slightly reduce office expenses but property costs have gone up primarily because of the increased cost of electricity.

THE BOTTOM LINE

The Council believes that this is a crucial time to invest in digital ministry opportunities; there are also some other areas where we know that we would like to focus accumulated resources in the coming year.

- We believe that our whole staff has risen to meet this challenging moment. The Council is committed to finding a way to appropriately thank these dedicated servants.
- We continue to be focused on finding a way to enhance and grow our Youth and Family ministries. Both of our College Interns for next year will focus their energies into this area. And, we are hopeful to be able to create a temporary Youth and Family position through designated funds to provide oversight and support as we prepare for the 2022 ELCA Youth Gathering.
- ➤ Finally, the Council remains committed to continuing to pursue alternative income opportunities.
